Executive Summary

The purpose of this review is to assess the activities of 23 Centers and Institutes at FSU. Nine are within the College of Social Sciences and Public Policy, four are within the College of Communication and Information, two are housed within the College of Arts and Sciences, four are housed within the College of Medicine, one is within the College of Engineering, one is housed within the International Programs area, one is housed jointly between the Colleges of Medicine and Human Sciences and one is housed jointly within the Colleges of Medicine and Law.

These Centers and Institutes provide a wide range of services, generate research and conference presentations, support direct work in the classroom, assist federal, state and local governments, serve non-profits and provide direct service to the community.

Of the 23 Centers reviewed, 17 have no E&G funding. Of the 6 that do, the ROI ranges from 1:.04 to 1:7.84. They are funded through several means: state contracts, several are funded through federal contracts or grants, several have endowment funds, though this is often combined with other funding sources, one receives a portion of its funding through royalties from a patent and one is funded primarily through fees for services offered.

Two of the Centers—PALM (Partnerships Advancing Library Media) Center and the Center for Universal Research to Eradicate Disease (CURED)—are recommended for termination. The others are recommended to retain their active status.

CDPH supports evidence-based public policy through its interdisciplinary research on demographic processes and population health; trains Master's students seeking careers as applied demographers; and mentors doctoral students in social demography, population economics, social epidemiology, and environment and health.

Activities:

a. Strengthen quality and reputation of scholarship, research and innovation in the areas of population health and mortality, fertility and reproductive health, and family structure and change.

- b. Increase collaboration and external support for research activity in the areas of population health and mortality, fertility and reproductive health, and family structure and change.
- c. Increase the number of degrees awarded in STEM and other areas of strategic emphasis, through its administration of the Master of Science in Demography degree program.
- d. Increase levels of community and business engagement through its start-up, the Applied Demographics Studio, which seeks to provide demographic consulting to local governments and non-profits in Florida.

Overall Status

What is the Center or Institute best known for? CDPH is best known for its training program; we administer the longest-running and most successful degree program in Applied Demography in the United States. Our alumni are employed by state and local governments throughout the country and by many federal offices, with the greatest share going to the U.S. Bureau of the Census.

What is the greatest strength of the Center or Institute? Our greatest strength is the reputation of our graduates for their competence as Applied Demographers, which translates into a post-graduation job placement rate approaching 75% within three months of graduation and 100% within six months.

What are the most significant challenges facing the Center or Institute? CDPH faces two critical challenges:

- (1) Because faculty lines are in departments, not centers, we are unable to hire faculty to replace those who have moved to other universities or retired. Since 2007, we have experienced a 40% reduction in number of faculty Associates. The decrease means more than being down in numbers; we have also lost grants won by these faculty members and their substantive expertise.
- (2) In contrast to population centers at other universities, CDPH lacks programming and data management support personnel. This lack has three impacts: (a) it limits the scope of faculty research because faculty members must do their own programming or work with colleagues at universities with such support; (b) it limits our competitiveness in grant applications and leads some faculty to subcontract for funding—meaning that FSU loses indirect costs; and (c) it limits our ability to provide practical experience—and partial funding—for students as programming trainees (although the new Applied Demographics Studio is intended to remedy this last item).

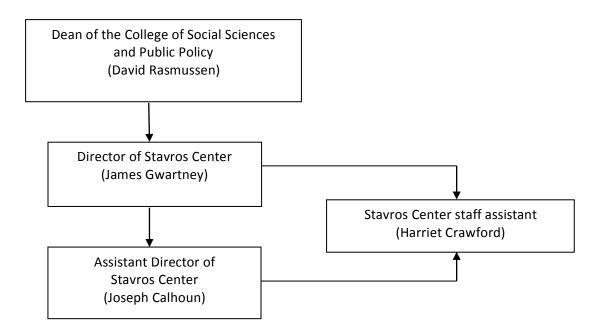

Activities:

A. In support of Research, the Pepper Institute offers grant support services (administrative staff), office space, and access to a 15-station computer lab. The computer lab is used by faculty and grad students for training workshops and for computer-based social science experiments (e.g., Jerit and Barabas. 2012. "Partisan Perceptual Bias and the Information Environment." *Journal of Politics* 74:672-84.). The Institute periodically hosts brown bag presentations by Institute faculty and students, and 1-2 times per year brings in a nationally renowned scholar for the Pepper Distinguished Speaker series (e.g., Prof. David Hacker, Yale, "Whither Retirement Security? The Political Struggle over Social Security and Medicare," Fall 2012). Faculty associates have allowances to support travel for presenting their work at conferences, and the Institute has a summer grant-writing fellowship program.

B. In support of Education, the Pepper Institute provides research opportunities for graduate students and administers the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at FSU. Graduate student opportunities include research assistantships that often result in co-authored publications with faculty associates of the Institute (http://pepperinstitute.fsu.edu/Research2/Publications) and a competitive two-semester fellowship that supports dissertation research on aging and public policy. The dissertation fellowship has been funded from various sources including the Claude Pepper Center. The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute, or OLLI, at FSU is a noncredit adult education program for community residents age 50 and older. OLLI at FSU offers a wide range of scholarly courses, hosts a noon lecture series, organizes cultural trips in the Southeast, and has begun offering courses abroad by working in conjunction with FSU's International Programs and the University of Virginia's Semester at Sea program. In 2013-14, OLLI at FSU had more than 800 members and offered over 70 different courses.

C. In support of Outreach, the Pepper Institute participates in policy discussions and state legislative outreach efforts. Associates of the Institute contribute to community forums on policies related to aging and health (e.g., Senator Bill Nelson's Roundtable on Aging Policy Issues held at the Pepper Center in Feb. 2013), weighing in on topics such as the Affordable Health Care Act or the regulation and funding of long-term care facilities. With funding from the Florida Department of Transportation, the Pepper Institute supports Florida's statewide Safe Mobility for Life Coalition whose goal is to reduce older driver crashes while maintaining their mobility. The Coalition's members are from 28 affiliated organizations spanning law enforcement, medicine, city planning, elder affairs, and traffic engineering. In support of the Coalition, the Pepper Institute employs a program coordinator and an office assistant, and the Institute houses the Safe Mobility for Life Resource Center that distributes educational and advocacy materials to events and individuals throughout the state (e.g., at last count over 7,000 aging road user guides have been sent to 2,675 Florida residents).

Overall Status

The Pepper Institute is best known for its research on social policies that impact older adults in the U.S., for its robust adult education program, and for its advocacy and outreach related to older driver safety.

• What is the greatest strength of the Center or Institute?

The Pepper Institute's greatest strength is its multidisciplinary approach to identifying policies and hosting programs that meaningfully improve the quality of life for older adults and their families.

• What are the most significant challenges facing the Center or Institute?

One of the current challenges faced by the Pepper Institute is the need to strengthen the coordination of our efforts to obtain external funding and our outreach activities with those of the College of Medicine and the new Institute for Successful Longevity. Another challenge is university classroom and parking space constraints that hinder the continued growth of OLLI at FSU.

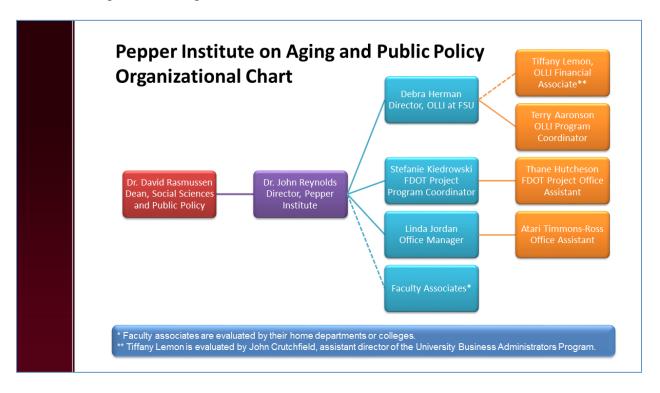

Additional Issues

Issues facing the Center or Institute

As mentioned under "most significant challenges facing the Center or Institute," the Pepper Institute is currently dealing with two challenges. The need to better coordinate with other research initiatives on aging at FSU is both a challenge and an opportunity. In response, the Pepper Institute worked with the Dean of the College of Social Sciences and Public Policy on a development plan that identifies the Institute's unique contribution to aging research at FSU. Specifically, we propose to conduct research that assesses the public policy options that affect successful aging through financial security and the ability to live independently. The Pepper Institute is excited about this potential renewed focus and direction for future growth.

Another issue facing the Institute is the relatively limited classroom space for the growing Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at FSU. The staff of OLLI at FSU have responded to this constraint

by creating partnerships with off-campus sites such as Westminster Oaks and Tallahassee Community College, but limited classrooms and insufficient parking space continue to be an obstacle to OLLI's goal of reaching 1,000+ members and qualifying for a (second) million dollar endowment from the Bernard Osher Foundation.

Overall Evaluation

- ✓ The Pepper Institute is meeting its mission to initiate research, educate students and provide outreach activities that address the opportunities and challenges of an aging population. It provides employment for faculty and students and allows for research resulting in numerous faculty and student publications as well as conference presentations. Additionally, it is responsible for the operation of the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute, or OLLI, at FSU is a non-credit adult education program for community residents age 50 and older. OLLI at FSU offers a wide range of scholarly courses, hosts a noon lecture series, organizes cultural trips in the Southeast, and has begun offering courses abroad. It is also well known for its research on older driver safety.

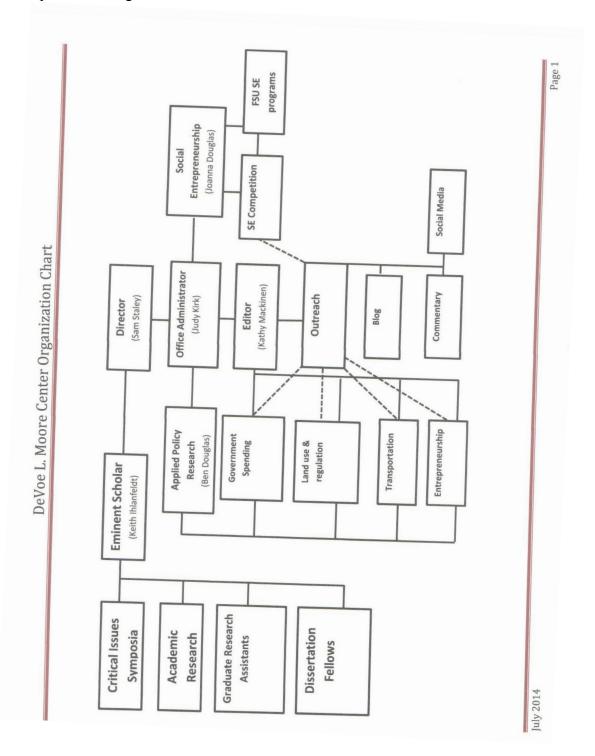

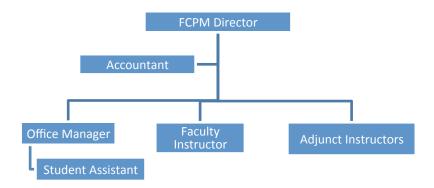

- 8. Increase Levels of Community and Business Engagement
- 9. Increase Community and Business Workforce

Activities:

a) FSU Virtual Operations Support Team (VOST)

FSU_VOST Social Media is increasingly a part of everyday life but many public safety agencies do not have the manpower to effectively leverage the medium during and after a disaster. Virtual Operations



Support Teams (VOSTs) are a relatively new concept that provides EM agencies and teams with an organized cadre of digital volunteers that can assist in media and social media areas.

The FSU EMHS Program has established the FSU.VOST to support Florida agencies during a disaster. Spearheaded by David Merrick, FSU.VOST fulfills two roles: It will be an operational tool for state or local EM agencies, as well as serving as a research platform on how social media and traditional media is utilized in a disaster.

b) Applied Emergency Management Studio - Haiti

The Emergency Management and Homeland Security Program at Florida State and CDRP created a unique program for FSU students to participate in hands-on EM work in Haiti. This Studio course is for upper division undergraduates (junior or senior status) and graduate students, and will focus on disaster plan development and community outreach.

The goal of this project is to provide students with real world experience in disaster planning in developing nations. EMHS has partnered with the Florida Association for Volunteerism in the Americas and the Caribbean (FAVACA) and the Haitian National Government's Ministry of Tourism to improve the preparedness of a small rural Haitian community. The island of Ile a Vache is located off the southern coast of Haiti, near the town of Les Cayes. Ile a Vache is approximately 10 miles long and covers about 165 square kilometers. The local population of approximately 15,000 is scattered across the island, but concentrates in several towns including Madam Bernard on the north coast of the island and Kaykok in the northwest.

Students and faculty will be performing the following tasks through the semester:

- Perform critical infrastructure surveys. This will included refuge locations and fresh water sources/storage systems.
- Develop a simple disaster management plan or SOP for local government officials and the population.
- Develop a hazard map of the population centers utilizing data collected by unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs).
- Train the local government and community leaders on the developed plan.
- The first trip to Ile a Vache will occur in January and will focus on data collection. Students and faculty will return to Tallahassee and analyze and organize the collected data. Over the next seven weeks, students will develop hazard maps and plan components. In April, the Studio team will return to the island to deliver the material and train government and the population.

This is a unique and powerful opportunity for FSU to contribute to the development of this community. Students in the Studio will gain valuable knowledge and expertise in disaster management, community outreach, training, and international relations.

c) Disaster Incident Research Team (DIRT)

Disasters, both natural and man-made, occur worldwide and can happen at any time of day, in any location. These events can have massive and long-reaching effects on society, some obvious and others more subtle. In order to better understand disasters The Center for Disaster Risk Policy (CDRP) at Florida State University has created the Disaster Incident Research Team (DIRT). CDRP is the applied and field research arm of the Emergency Management and Homeland Security Academic Program at FSU. The CDRP staff have



decades of operational emergency management, communication, and information technology experience.

This team is designed to carry out multi-discipline research in and around disaster areas. DIRT can gather data to understand about how disasters affect populations, infrastructure, and communities. Research projects will span all phases of disaster management with particular emphasis on near-event preparedness, response, and recovery.

DIRT will employ new tools in data collection and verification, allowing researchers to quickly and safely address research questions, gather input from survivors and responders, and document cases. DIRT projects range from traditional disaster management queries to sociological and geographical research on impact and recovery. By utilizing faculty and students from many disciplines DIRT has a unique flexibility and enables field research that may not have been feasible before.

d) Small Unmanned Aerial Systems in Emergency Management

CDRP is beginning research into how Small Unmanned Aerial Systems (sUAS) can be utilized by emergency and disaster managers.

These versatile systems can capture still and video imagery of disaster impacts and provide critical near real time assessments – for a fraction of the cost of manned aircraft. However, there are numerous practical and regulatory obstacles to deploying these tools, and few emergency managers know how to even start assessing the capability of these systems.

CDRP's project is looking at a variety of UAVs and providing realistic comparisons of capability. Further, CDRP is looking to integrate UAVs with traditional EM methodologies of damage assessment and reconnaissance and provide easy to use guidance on how these missions can be accomplished using UAVs.

Research began in August of 2013 and is ongoing.

e) Florida Virtual Business Emergency Operations Center (FLVBEOC)

Emergency Support Function 18 (ESF-18) was developed as part of the State Emergency Response Team (SERT) to integrate disaster response with private sector organizations in the state of Florida.



ESF-18 coordinates local, state, and federal agency actions that provide immediate and short-term assistance for the needs of businesses, industry, and economic stabilization. Further, ESF-18 works with business and industry to identify available resources to meet the needs of the state and its citizens. The Florida Virtual Business Emergency Operations Center (FLVBEOC), in support of ESF-18, serves as a clearinghouse for business continuity and recovery information during and post-disaster. It aggregates

information from a variety of government and private-sector sources, and is designed to provide business owners with the information and tools they need to make decisions regarding the safety of their personnel and property.

f) Disaster Contractors Network (DCN)

The Disaster Contractors Network (DCN) is an innovative and unique public-private partnership that provides critical services and training to building professionals and homeowners after a disaster. The Disaster Contractors Network provides contractors and impacted homeowners with the information and resources they need to help successfully repair or rebuild damaged homes after a disaster strikes.



A partnership of public and private organizations, DNC helps connect contractors with the information they need to work in devastated communities. At the same time DCN provides a vehicle for homeowners to find the right kind of contractor for their repair/rebuilding needs. Registration for the DCN is free for contractors and homeowners.

g) Seminole Storm

The Seminole Storm exercise was the product of a semester-long Exercise Design course taught at Florida State University by Emergency Management and Homeland Security Academic Program faculty members David Merrick and Robert McDaniel. Students were assigned missions that allowed them to be part of the design, development, execution and after-action analysis of a tabletop exercises and functional exercise associated with this project. In addition to these real-world responsibilities students were



required to complete research papers and pass examinations to receive a passing grade.

Seminole Storm consisted of two exercises; a tabletop exercise for executive level faculty/staff and a functional exercise for all FSU departments and units. The scenario for Seminole Storm placed the main campus of FSU in the direct path of a CAT2 hurricane. This exercise was intended to establish a controlled environment for those responsible for critical facilities and student safety to implement emergency plans, policies, and procedures as they pertain to severe hurricane weather.

Tabletop Exercise System Technology (TEST) - (Royalty based software fiscally managed by the FSU Foundation)

Tabletop Exercise System Technology: One way to prepare for natural and manmade disasters is through training and one of the best ways to train the members of your organization, association, agency or business is by participation in discussion based or tabletop exercises.

While traditional tabletop exercises can be effective they can also be limited by their one-size-fits-all approach, the skill of the facilitator, and inefficient capturing of information for later use.

To address those limitations the Center for Disaster Risk Policy at Florida State University developed the Tabletop Exercise System Technology, or T.E.S.T.

T.E.S.T. is a first-of-its-kind, computer-based tabletop exercise system that simplifies the development, delivery, and after-action reporting of

training exercises. With T.E.S.T. just one facilitator can accommodate large audiences of over 100 participants. In fact, the number of users is limited only by the availability of computers.

T.E.S.T. is specially designed to:

- Apply to a wide range of situations and clients
- Facilitate large audiences
- Quickly modify scenarios during training
- Energize audiences and keep their attention
- Involve more participants in discussion
- Standardize quality delivery
- Reduce facilitator workload
- Allow easy development of new training exercises

Capture lessons and provide immediate reports to participants on site T.E.S.T. has been used to train and exercise over 800 agencies and over 4000 federal, state and local governmental officials to respond to such disasters as avian flu, bioterrorism attacks, hurricanes and food-borne contamination.

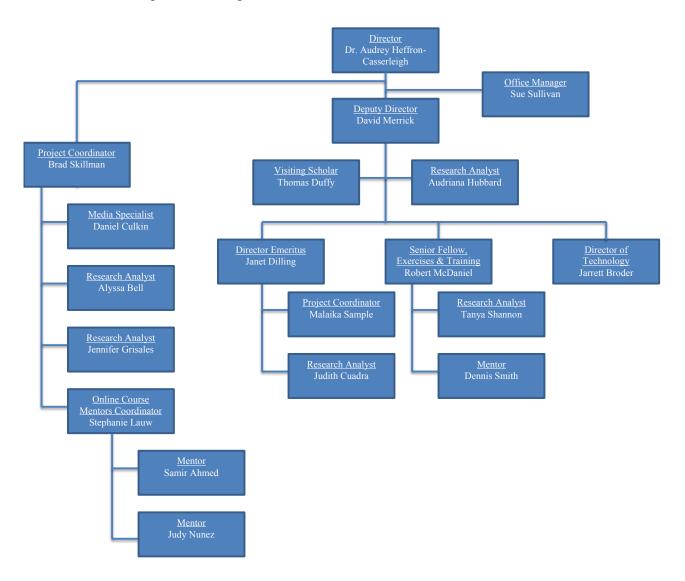

The L. L. Schendel Speech and Hearing Clinic has a dual mission: (a) to provide effective community services that improve the communication abilities of individuals of all ages and (b) to provide a teaching and clinical research laboratory that seeks to develop exemplary assessment and treatment procedures for use by our students and professionals in speech-language pathology and audiology. Innovative and relevant theory development, research, and services are viewed as unitary academic, research, and clinical efforts that combined, strive for one goal: the enhancement of the communicative well-being of the individuals served.

Activities:

a. The Clinic is an integral component of the quality and reputation of the School of Communication Science and Disorders (SCSD) at Florida State University, and allows our graduates to attain a 100% employment rate. The most recent *U.S. News and World Report* graduate program rankings ranked our graduate program 21st out of 298 programs nationally. The clinical training provided in our Clinic meets the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association's (ASHA) accreditation standards for training students who will be able to pursue the ASHA Certificate of Clinical Competence in speech-language pathology and state licensure as a speech-language pathologist.

Approximately 70 graduate students participate each year in high quality assessments and interventions to address the hearing, speech and swallowing, language and literacy, and augmentative communication needs of individuals with communication impairments. The students are supervised by certified, licensed and highly qualified faculty specializing in clinical services and education. Students gain knowledge and skills competencies through supervised practice to become highly qualified SLPs in a variety of settings, including health care and education.

The clinic also serves as an observational and introduction to practice laboratory for the 180 undergraduates enrolled in CSD. It also offers observational opportunities to local students enrolled in our BRIDGE program for individuals seeking post-baccalaureate courses in speech-language pathology and audiology in order to apply to a graduate degree program.

- b. As stated in our Mission, the Clinic offers a clinical research laboratory for faculty and students to unite to develop and integrate evidenced based practice into the services offered by the Clinic. Further, the SCSD faculty and graduate students are able to conduct clinical research that will improve the lives of our clients and enhance the diffusion of innovations for individuals with communication impairments nationwide.
- c. With regards to community engagement, the Clinic provides a full service speech and hearing practice for both the local and regional community, serving more than 500 individuals annually. Our clinic provides a valuable service to many individuals that would not be able to access services elsewhere because of our support for children's services through quarterly gifts from the Scottish Rite

Foundation, our reduced fees for FSU students and employees, a sliding-scale feefor-service system for those individuals who meet income guidelines, and our acceptance of Medicaid. We are one of the area's few speech and hearing practices that accepts Medicaid; in fact, we are the only audiology practice between Panama City and Jacksonville who accepts Medicaid for audiology services. Further, we recently have started offering cochlear implant mapping, which is another audiology service that has previously been unavailable in the NW Florida region. We offer services across the many types of communication impairments that impact individuals of all ages. We also provide prevention activities and family support.

d. As stated previously, the Clinic contributes to the community's workforce given that we have a 100% employment rate of our graduates. An overwhelming majority of these graduates go on to take jobs in Florida in both healthcare and educational settings.

Overall Status

• What is the Center or Institute best known for?

FSU's L.L. Schendel Speech and Hearing Clinic is best known for accomplishing its dual mission: students become highly competent clinicians while participating in the provision of high quality services to our community membership. We do not believe one component of the mission can be achieved without the other. Our students provide timely and evidence based practice mentored by nationally recognized faculty.

• What is the greatest strength of the Center or Institute?

Our greatest strength is the interchange between our expert faculty and the enthusiastic students focused on addressing the unique needs of every individual that walks through our doors. Each client is treated with respect and provided with the latest options for communication assessment and intervention.

Further, our graduate students are required to participate in a research project as part of their academic requirements. Many of these students elect to conduct a clinical intervention project and recruit clients from our clinic. Through these opportunities, students learn to use the scientific literature to create evidence-based interventions, collaborate with faculty experts in a given area of communication disorders, and collect their own data on how those interventions actually work with a real person. It also permits our clients the opportunity to participate in research and make a contribution to the future care of others who have their same diagnosis. Students learn to become team members with other professionals and with the clients themselves. It is also a great strength that the FSU Clinic works closely with other agencies in the community to ensure that we offer support where the need is greatest and that we seek to maintain our

competition-neutral status in the community. We address the needs of our FSU students as a priority and also support FSU faculty and staff campus-wide.

• What are the most significant challenges facing the Center or Institute? Our greatest challenge at this time is having adequate faculty and funding to meet both the training needs of our graduate students and the community's need for services. Many of our clients are ineligible for insurance reimbursement for their therapy, and the ones who are eligible have varying coverage. Clients without insurance also have varying ability to pay out-of-pocket. Earlier, it was mentioned that we provide services to Medicaid recipients but Medicaid's reimbursement for services is well below our standard charges. We feel it is critical, however, to be a resource for community members who might otherwise go unserved. Thus, continued financial support of our operations from clinic revenues alone is a significant challenge.

With student training equal in importance to our services to individuals, our faculty spend significant time and resources meeting both components of the mission. The university's budget status has significantly affected our ability to employ adjunct faculty, resulting in fewer students and ultimately fewer clients to participate in the Clinic. While budget cuts have reduced our capacity to serve the numbers of students and clients, it has not dimmed our vision or commitment to delivery of high quality services, teaching, and research.

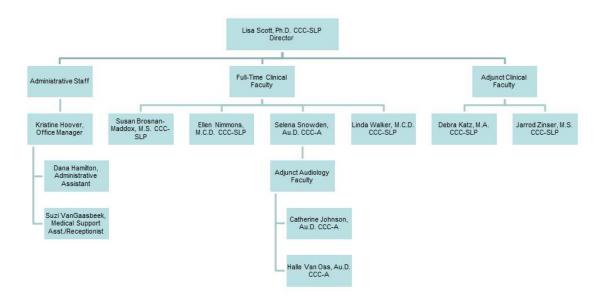

The Florida Blue Center for Rural Health Research and Policy was established in December 2002 with a gift endowment from Blue Cross Blue Shield of Florida. The center is dedicated to the advancement of quality health services and research in Florida's rural communities.

The core mission of the center includes researching and addressing the unique challenges and opportunities facing Florida's rural health care system, providers, and consumers.

Approximately 10% of Florida's population lives in rural communities and are adversely impacted by limited access to care and a maldistribution of physicians. The center's work helps the state better understand what Rural Florida is facing and how to address those needs.

At the policy level, the Center works at the state and national level to be a source of and have a reputation for providing quality information about rural Florida and rural Floridians to inform policy and regulatory issues. A measure of success is the number of calls we receive for information or input on issues related to rural health. Within the research sphere, the Center works across colleges, across campuses, and across communities, leading or partnering with others, to bring together multidisciplinary researchers and students along with community stakeholders to conducts needs assessments, develop clinical and public health programs, and to develop patient centered outcomes research proposals for submission to funders (public and private). Similarly we reach out to community stakeholders (faith community, business leaders, health providers, educators, etc.) to engage them in helping improve the health of their communities.

Seven Year Highlights:

Conducted five statewide rural Town Halls to engage community in validation of Florida State Rural Health Plan.

Successfully applied to Florida Blue Foundation to create and annually organize the Rural Education Opportunity Program (REOP), the implementation of a best practice out of the University of Minnesota Duluth to promote medical student interest in rural practice. 600 incoming FSU COM students have visited 15 rural communities in 11 Panhandle counties.

Supported successful network grant application for rural health workforce development in six rural counties (Hamilton, Jefferson, Lafayette, Madison, Suwannee, Taylor) and continue active involvement as member of advisory board. The Network has held 3 Annual Summits, and hosted 1-2 Health Scholars Camps each summer since 2010.

Supported successful planning grant application to bring local health care to Havana community in Gadsden County, Havana Health and Wellness, and continue active advisory involvement. Planning activities involved MPH, RN, and social work students (FSU and FAMU) in community needs assessment engaging faith community, seniors, educators, policymakers, and businesses in Havana. The Florida Blue Center for Rural Health Research and Policy has a director and no other staff. The endowment from Florida Blue in 2003 was matched by the Legislature and supports a portion of the director's salary.

Additional Issues

Issues facing the Center or Institute: Funding for rural health research is very limited, although agencies like NIH and AHRQ do list rural as a priority population. HRSA, the major funder of rural health programs (outreach, network) and research, funds the latter through rural health research centers around the county. This program is competitively rebid every 4 years now. The Center director for this report joined FSU in late 2007 at the point when the centers were being recompeted and did not submit an application. The rural research centers were recompeted again in late 2012-2013. The Center jointly with the Southwest Rural Health Research Center at Texas A&M University School of Rural Public Health submitted a Center grant focused on Rural Healthy People. The proposal was unsuccessful however Rural Healthy People 2020 is today a joint effort of the Texas A&M SRPH and the FSU College of Medicine. It does have an expert advisory board drawn from around the country. Efforts to secure funding for Rural Healthy People have been ongoing since 2010. Although there has been a lot of interest from the broader rural community in Rural Healthy People, evidenced by invitations to speak and present results of recent efforts, these have not resulted in extramural funding.

Overall Evaluation

- ✓ The Florida Blue Center for Rural Health Research and Policy is meeting its mission of researching and addressing the unique challenges and opportunities facing Florida's rural health care system, providers, and consumers. It provides leadership and participate with colleagues within COM, FSU, in the community (business, faith community, provider organizations, government, non-profit) and statewide to develop partnerships, identify health needs, assist in the preparation of grants and participates in the selection of candidates for COM admission. It provides leadership and participates with colleagues regionally and nationally to educate and advocate on behalf of rural and underserved populations and facilitates the development of an annual rural experience for incoming medical and other health or allied health professions students (e.g., MPH, RN) and serves as mentor/preceptor to MPH, medical, graduate, and undergraduate students for research efforts related to rural health and rural communities. These opportunities for both faculty and especially students are valuable.
- ✓ There is no E&G funding within this Center. No ROI can be calculated.

The FSU Autism Institute was established to coordinate and promote research, education, and service related to autism spectrum disorder (ASD). The Autism Institute will advance knowledge of autism through interdisciplinary collaborations and bridge the gap between research and practice through the use of information technology. The mission of the Autism Institute is: 1) to promote interdisciplinary research that advances scientific knowledge of ASD; 2) to bridge the gap between scientific knowledge and clinical/educational practice; 3) to build the capacity of primary care and other service providers, educators, employers, family members, and individuals with ASD to improve outcomes through research and training; and 4) to maximize the use of innovative video and computer information technology in research, education, and service related to ASD.

Briefly, what activities are consistently performed that move the C/I toward meeting its established mission? This section should also include activities related to meeting the State Board of Governor's mission. The State Board of Governors mission includes the following:

The Florida State University College of Medicine (FSU COM), the first new medical school of the 21st Century, was established in June 2000 by the Florida Legislature with the mission of serving the unique needs of Floridians. The College of Medicine focuses on educating outstanding physicians for practice in community settings. It is located on the campus of one of the nation's elite research universities, Florida State University (FSU), a public institution that has the Carnegie Foundation's highest designation (Doctoral/Research University-Extensive) and offers a distinctive academic environment built on its cherished values and unique heritage. The college is designed as a community-based medical school, where students spend their first two years taking basic science courses on the FSU campus in Tallahassee and are then assigned to one of the regional medical school campuses for their third- and fourth-year clinical training. The 2+2 pre-clerkship/clerkship year's structure is distinguished by the extent and diversity of clinical training and experiences across the four-year continuum.

Florida Statute 1004.42 defined the purpose of the FSU COM to prepare "... physicians to practice primary care, geriatric, and rural medicine, to make appropriate use of emerging technologies, and to function successfully in a rapidly changing health care environment; advancing knowledge in the applied biomedical and behavioral sciences, geriatric research, autism, cancer, and chronic diseases; ..." The Autism Institute was established in 2008 in the FSU COM as a mechanism to meet the intent of this statute relating to advancing knowledge in autism and to build the capacity of autism research at FSU that capitalizes on the unique strengths of the FSU COM. Below is a description of the facilities and resources of the Autism Institute and the FSU COM.

Activities:

- 1. The research and grant activities of the Autism Institute strengthen the quality and reputation of academic programs affiliated with the Institute through funded research and services as well as grant support for faculty, staff, graduate and undergraduate students to be trained on health services and education research related to ASD.
- 2. Through the development of innovative technology to address the healthcare and education needs of children and adults with ASD, and research on implementation of these innovations, the activities of the Autism Institute strengthen the quality and reputation of scholarship, research and innovation at FSU.
- 3. Faculty and staff in the Autism Institute are developing Autism Navigator®, a collection of web-based courses and tools to build the capacity of primary care providers, early intervention providers, educators, and families, Increase Research and Commercialization Activity
- 4. The FSU Autism Institute is completely funded by contracts and grants. A primary activity is increase collaboration and external support for research activities with state and federal agencies.
- 5. The activities of the FSU Autism Institute involve community-based health services research as well as training and service. We collaborate with state and federal

agencies as well as community providers and businesses who serve our clients. The activities contribute to increasing levels of community and business engagement in our research as well as the provision of training, education, and service through early detection, early intervention, and technical support for children and adults with ASD.

Overall Status

 The FSU Autism Institute is best known for our community-based early detection of ASD in children 12-24 months of age through the FIRST WORDS Project as well as early intervention work through the Early Social Interaction Project. Because the average age of diagnosis of ASD is 4-5 years, the work that we are doing has the potential to transform the healthcare and education systems and reduce the life-long cost of ASD. We are also known for our collaboration as part of the Florida statewide network- the Center for Autism and Related Disabilities (CARD).
- What is the greatest strength of the Center or Institute?

 One of the greatest strength of the Autism Institute is the unique expertise and skill of the faculty and staff to understand ASD and the needs of their families and constituents. We are also leaders in community-based research, which is becoming a priority for more federal agencies, positioning us well to compete for new research grants.
- What are the most significant challenges facing the Center or Institute? The most significant challenges facing the Autism Institute are maintaining the funding flow. We have a good track record of getting contracts and grants. We have worked closely with the VP of Sponsored Research and the FSU Office of Commercialization in our efforts toward commercialization of Autism Navigator, which will provide an additional revenue stream for the Autism Institute and help with sustainability of funding as contracts and grants ebb and flow.

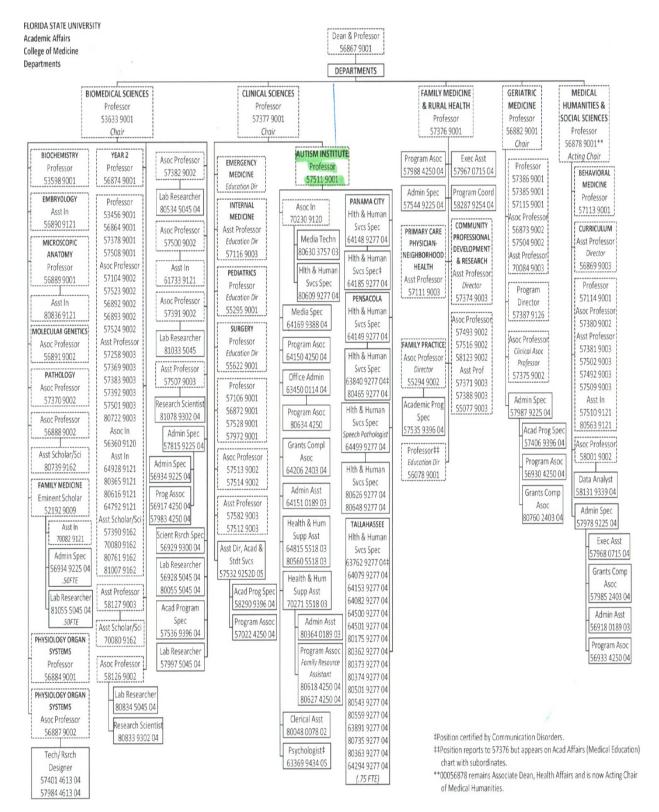

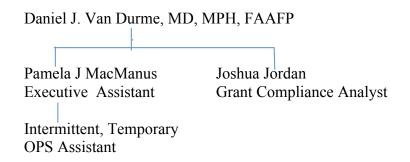

Interest in Global Health continues to grow rapidly for a wide range of reasons. The Center is often approached by a variety of potential partners (academic institutions, NGOs, private individuals, and others) with a desire for some type of collaboration, primarily in the areas of service and education. Additionally, medical students increasingly have an interest in this field and look for more opportunities for service learning. The greatest challenge is that there is a limited amount of time/energy from the Director of the Center and limited staff and budget such that most requests are turned away. Discussions are underway on how the Center may grow its resources, but this is largely dependent on the other commitments of the Director.

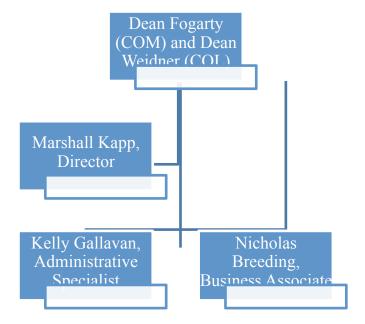

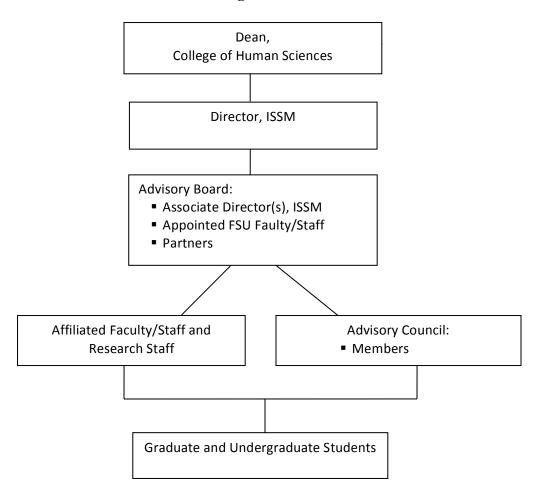
